Introduction and Context

Introduction and Context The s6 duty requires that public authorities 'must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity so far as consistent with the proper exercise of their functions and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems'. To comply with the S6 duty public authorities should embed the consideration of biodiversity and ecosystems into their early thinking and business planning, including any policies, plans, programmes and projects, as well as their day to day activities. Brymbo Community Council's tax base is 1986 with a precept requirement of £148,136.00 for 2025/2026. The Council has no other properties. The Council employs 1 part time Clerk. The Community Council area comprises of three electoral wards.

The following are located within the Community Council boundary:

- There are seven equipped play areas, 2 multi-use games areas and a skate park. These are owned by Wrexham County Borough Council with the exception of Tanyfron MUGA, but their maintenance and repair are funded by the Community Council via a service level agreement.
- The areas of open space in the community include Bronwens' Green which is owned and maintained by Brymbo Community Council. This facility is available for the use of residents from all wards. This area includes a fishing pool which Brymbo CC lease for a peppercorn rent to Brymbo Angling Club.
- Brymbo Community Council own a porta cabin which is used by WCBC play scheme and the youth service staff which runs during school holidays and evenings. Both services are financially supported by the Community Council.

Brymbo Community Council have seen that the rubbish collection events have been hugely successful with residents participating and keen to help. Skips have been filled with rubbish that had previously been cluttering gardens and green spaces.

The litter picking days have also been successful. The equipment purchased by BCC has been used on a number of occasions and residents are happy to help keep the villages tidy.

Funding is an on-going concern regarding some projects, and with ongoing increasing costs this could have an impact on the next financial year.

How and when will the s6 duty be monitored and the s6 plan reviewed?

The s6 plan will be reviewed in light of these reports and any other evidence or information that is made available to the Council. At the time of this report's publication, there is no specific time or date set for the plan to be reviewed.

BCC will be looking to engage more with the Community in the next few years. This will hopefully mean more litter picking days, and engaging with WCBC re rubbish/skip collections days.

Increase liaison with Wrexham CBC's Biodiversity Officer and seek advice whenever necessary. Encourage and support community groups and residents more to fully participate in events and projects to raise awareness.
